Age Appropriate Homework Expectations

Spelling Expectations	Practice common exception words for 10 minutes 3 x a week List of words can be found on the class pages of the school website
Reading Expectations:	Read for 10 minutes each day and write in your Reading Record. Please refer to age appropriate 'Reading Fluency Skills' on the class pages of the school website. Read a page or 2 in your head and ask someone to ask you comprehension questions about what has happened.
Maths Expectations:	Recall and use addition and subtraction facts to 20 and related facts to 100 Use knowledge of counting in 2s, 5s and 10s to answer multiplication and division questions. Recall x and division facts for 2, 5 and 10 times tables.

Dedicating time each day to homework & helps you to form effective learning habits.

Topic Tasks

Please pick a different activity to **do with your family each week**. Completing your homework with your family should be a positive experience, the discussion & fun you have is just as important as the outcome. Enjoy!

There is no right or wrong way to complete the task. Take as long, or as little, time as you like on these tasks. A large project may take a number of weeks.

Bring Topic Tasks to school in any way you like: email, photo, written, scrap book, artwork, edible... You can send any photos that you take to the class teacher or print them out to show the class.

Create a travel brochure or guide to India, or an area of India, giving as much information as you can. (English)	Find out about the different religions in India and write 5 facts about each. (RE)	Make shadow puppets to retell 'Gobble You Up!' (or your version of it.) You could put on a show and film it! (DT)
Investigate a style of Indian music, e.g. Bhangra or Bollywood, and present your findings using a method of your choice. (Music)	Investigate Indian food – show us what you have found out using writing, photos, pictures, recipes etc. You could also try following a recipe and making some Indian food. (DT)	Write a letter to a child in India telling them all about your life in England. You could talk about where you live, your hobbies, your school day and what you like to eat. (English)
Find out about an Indian animal. Can you draw it in its habitat and write some facts about the animal and its habitat? (Science)	There are lots of Indian Festivals. Choose one and create a poster, persuading people to join the celebrations. (RE)	Draw a map of your village/local area and label the main buildings or facilities. (Geography)
Find out about traditional Indian clothing and present your findings in pictures. (Art/DT)	Find out about a famous Indian – tell us all about them and what they are famous for. (History)	Investigate Henna designs and create one of your own (on paper!) (Art)
